Overview

Youth violence is a global public health problem. It includes a range of acts from bullying and physical fighting, to more severe sexual and physical assault and even homicide. According to OECD PISA report "How prevalent is bullying at school", 30,6% of 15-year-olds reported having faced physical or psychological abuse at school several times a month. Results of the research "Addressing Sexual Bullying Across Europe" (2015) showed that 73% of youth aged 13 to 18 have been sexually assaulted more than once in their life. According to data provided by UNESCO (2019) "Behind the numbers: Ending school violence and bullying" - Globally, one in three children experiences bullying and a similar proportion are affected by physical violence.

Effective prevention of violence among adolescents and young adults is a key strategy for reducing rates of bullying, gender-based violence (GBV) and school dropout, and empowering social inclusion. A majority of the action in that regard is needed directly in schools, where most of these violent actions thrive. Yet, studies in different settings across the EU, show that school counselors don't have a clear idea of what their actions could be in response to bullying and are often not considered as part of the solution to bullying.

In 2010, MARTA Centre, a key project partner, started a prevention program - Methodology for working with youth groups on violence prevention and healthy relationships – for youth (ages 13-18) aiming to raise their awareness of gender equality, challenge the traditional gender stereotypes and thus reduce the risk for young boys and girls to experience violence and become victims of human trafficking and/or to become perpetrators. After piloting the methodology in 5 countries (during the projects Dare to Care and Re-GROUP), the partners believe the good practices from the methodology can and should be expanded and adjusted for different settings.

Dare to ACT addresses the engagement and preparedness of school counselors and youth workers as actors in constant contact with the target groups, which work in key locations for preventing and stopping violence in youth. This project aims to unite school psychologists and counselors as well as youth workers; educators and other professionals working constantly and closely with young people from the participating countries, equip them with already existing and tested knowledge, derived from the Youth Group Methodology approach, guide them through adaptation of it to local needs and cultural context.

Objectives

Dare to ACT aims to:

- Reduce violence-supportive attitudes by working directly with young girls and boys (ages 13-18) and by changing underlying harmful social norms and gender stereotypes that drive gender inequality and violence towards and among children and youth;

- Provide needed knowledge to educational and support staff in schools and youth centers to recognize and stop violence among and towards youth (ages 13-18);

- Equip school counsellors, school psychologists and youth workers with skills to help them battle with prejudice, related to violence and how we can intervene.
